Entry Requirements An Australian Tertiary Admission Rand (ATAR) of 65, or its equivalent (e.g. OP \leq 16; OR Articulation from suitable University College programs; OR Mature Age Special Entry Admission for those who have reached the age of 21; AND Satisfactorily completes a pre-enrolment interview with a relevant course advisor.

Duration: 3 years full-time or 9 years (maximum) part-time.

Attendance Type: Full-time, part-time.

Delivery Mode: Online, face-to-face, or multi-modal

Structure: 216 credit points (24 units).

English Proficiency:

Applicants whose entry qualifications were obtained in an institution where English is not the language of instruction normally require a minimum IELTS (or equivalent) score of 6.0 with no score less than 5.5 in all bands of the test.

Exit Points

Students enrolled in the Bachelor of Theology may exit with a Diploma of Christian Studies or Associate Degree of Theology and Ministry, provided they have met the requirements of the award.

Graduate Profile and Rationale

The Bachelor of Theology course is a primary undergraduate award that provides a broad and coherent study of theology and related disciplines. This degree prepares candidates for professional and lay Christian ministry and for further learning beyond the degree.

The course is organised through a structure of majors and sub-majors (see Academic Regulations section 2.1). Not all majors and sub-majors are available at all Teaching Bodies. However, students may be able to complete a desired major or sub-major by completing units offered at another Member Institution.

Course Outcomes

Knowledge

Graduates will have:

- a broad and coherent body of knowledge in Theology, Biblical Studies, and one other discipline or area of practice, that will form the basis for independent lifelong learning.

Skills

Graduates will have cognitive, communication, and technical skills in a theology related body of knowledge, so that they are able to:

- review, reflect on, and synthesize theological information and identify and provide solutions to complex problems;
- think critically and to generate and evaluate complex ideas;
- demonstrate an understanding of theoretical concepts in theology;
- communicate theologically-related knowledge, skills and ideas clearly and coherently.

Applications of Knowledge and Skills

Graduates will have the ability to:

- demonstrate an understanding of theological knowledge by applying it creatively in Christian ministry;
- make high level, independent judgments in a range of ministry settings;
- initiate, plan, and implement activities and projects within a range of ministry settings.

Academic regulations for the Bachelor of Theology

1 Admission to Candidature

1.1 An applicant for admission to candidature into the Bachelor of Theology shall:

- 1.1.1 have an Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) of 65, or its equivalent (e.g.OP \leq 16); OR
- 1.1.2 have adequate grounds for Special Entry; OR
- 1.1.3 articulate from appropriate Australian University College of Divinity programs; OR
- 1.1.4 Mature Age and Special Entry Admission for those who have reached the age of 21; AND
- 1.1.5 Satisfactorily completes a pre-enrolment interview with a relevant course advisor.

1.2 A candidate for the Bachelor of Theology shall be designated as full-time or part-time. A candidate for a Bachelor of Theology will be designated as full-time or part-time. A student is designated as full-time if enrolled in 27 credit points or more in a semester, or part-time if enrolled in fewer than 27 credit points per semester.

1.3 No candidate for the Bachelor of Theology may be concurrently enrolled in any other undergraduate or postgraduate course within the University College or any other tertiary institution unless approval has been granted by the Academic Board.

1.4 Applicants whose entry qualifications were obtained in an institution where English is not the language of instruction normally will be required to demonstrate competency in English by:

- 1.4.1 achieving an IELTS (or equivalent) result of 6.0 with no score below 5.5 in all bands of the test.

1.5 Application for enrolment in the Bachelor of Theology is made to the Registrar of the appropriate Member Institution offering the course.

2 Course Structure

2.2 The Bachelor of Theology requires the completion of 216 credit points (24units) which shall include:

- 2.2.1 Three sub-major sequences
 - 2.2.1.1 Biblical Studies
 - 2.2.1.2 Systematic Theology
 - 2.2.1.3 Humanities in the Christian Tradition (or its subdisciplines) or Christian Life and Ministry (or its subdisciplines) or Theology (or its subdisciplines).
- 2.2.2 One of these sub-majors will be extended to a major;
AND
- 2.2.3 At least 9 credit points in Church History

2.3 All course units will be taken from the University College Schedule of units of study.

2.4 Majors and sub-majors are available in:

2.4.1 Biblical Studies

2.4.1.1 Biblical Studies (The Bachelor of Theology Biblical Studies major requires 54 credit points [see details below] plus 9 credit points in A7112 Introduction to Biblical Hebrew, A7122 Introduction to New Testament Greek, or A7111 Introduction to Biblical Languages taken before or concurrently with any post-7100 series Biblical Studies units).

2.4.2 Humanities in the Christian Tradition

2.4.2.1 Humanities in the Christian Tradition, subdisciplines Church History, Philosophy

2.4.3 Christian Life and Ministry

2.4.3.1 Christian Life and Ministry, subdisciplines Christian Spirituality, Mission, Pastoral Counselling, Pastoral Theology

2.4.4 Theology

2.4.4.1 Theology subdisciplines in Systematic Theology; Worship and Liturgy

2.5 A major in a subdiscipline requires 54 credit points from the subdiscipline, with not more than 18 credit points from 7100 series units. Under certain provisions (see 2.9), up to 36 credit points from 8100 and 9200 series units may be included.

2.6 A major in a discipline requires 54 credit points from the discipline, with at least 27 credit points in one subdiscipline, with not more than 18 credit points from 7100 series units. Under certain provisions (see 2.7), up to 36 credit points from 8100 and 9200 series units may be included.

2.7 A sub-major requires 36 credit points from units assigned to the major including no more than 18 credit points from 7100 series units and with at least one 7200 series unit.

2.8 Units coded "A" are not counted towards a major/sub-major in any discipline or subdiscipline.

2.9 Candidates who have completed 108 credit points towards the Bachelor of Theology may select up to 36 credit points from the Schedule of 8100 and 9200 series units. Within these units, a candidate can only select up to 18 credit points of 9200 series units, provided they have already completed at least a sub-major in that subdiscipline with a Grade Point Average of at least 2.0.

2.10 All course units will be taken from the University College Schedule of Units of Study.

3 Period of Candidature

3.1 The period of candidature for the Bachelor of Theology shall normally be 3 years (6 Semesters) full-time and up to 9 years (18 Semesters) part-time.

3.2 In certain circumstances the Student Support and Support and Administration Committee may grant course extensions.

4 Leave of Absence

4.1 The Student Support and Administration Committee may grant leave of absence from the Bachelor of Theology. The period of leave shall not be counted as part of the period of candidature for the award.

4.2 The period of leave shall normally be one semester after which a candidate may apply for a further period of one semester or will be required to complete candidature.

5 Assessment

5.1 The assessment of subject units shall be in the manner approved by the Academic Board in line with the University College's established guidelines for assessment packages at the undergraduate/postgraduate level.

5.2 Students may be required by the Academic Board to present themselves for oral examination.

5.3 Academic and non-academic misconduct will be penalised in accordance with the Policies and Regulations of the University College, whose stipulations are severe.

6 Credit

6.1 Candidates may seek credit up to a maximum of 144 credit points in the Bachelor of Theology.

6.2 Credit will be granted for units that are from an equivalent award or institution and have outcomes, content, demand hours, and assessment equivalent to that of units in the Bachelor of Theology.

7 Saving Clause

7.1 Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein, the Academic Board of the University College may, in any case in which it may deem it appropriate to do so, vary, dispense with, or suspend any requirement or prescription by these regulations, and report forthwith to the Council of the University College.
